

Hiwa-i-te-rangi Emma Gunn

As part of our Inquiry unit on turangawaewae, this term Hiwa-i-te-rangi has been learning about early Polynesian explorers and how they navigated their way to Aotearoa. We learnt about the star compass or kapehu whetu, a mental concept that helped early Māori navigators use the stars and the horizon to navigate the seas. We also learnt about Tupaia, who was a master navigator and high priest who sailed on board the Endeavour with Captain Cook on his first voyage to Aotearoa. We then made our own waka, following specific criteria and experimenting with different hulls and sails.



Art




