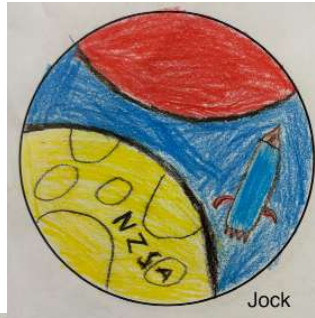


# Discovery | Waipuna-ā-rangi

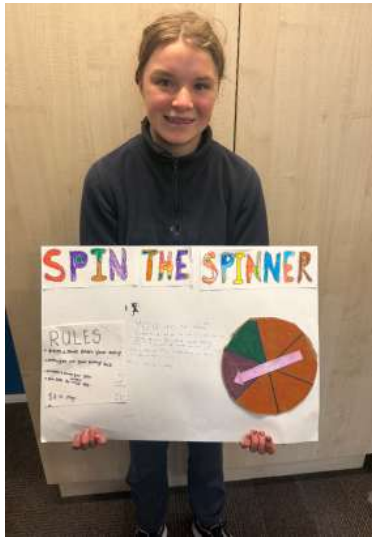
# Exploring | Hiwa-i-te-rangi and Matariki

**Universal Declaration of Human Rights**

Article #9

**Article Definition**

Everyone has the right to liberty and security of person. No one shall be subjected to arbitrary arrest or detention. No one shall be deprived of his liberty except on such grounds and in accordance with such procedure as are established by law.

# Level 2/3 History

**9/11**

During the Cold War (1979-1999), the Soviet Union invaded Afghanistan. To counter them, the United States secretly funded and armed Islamic resistance fighters, known as the Mujahideen. The Soviets were eventually forced to withdraw, but this US strategy caused massive "blowback." The network of heavily armed, US-trained foreign fighters, which included Osama bin Laden, later used that exact training and funding to create the extremist group Al-Qaeda.

Introduced by President George W. Bush after the 9/11 attacks, the "Bush Doctrine" was a radical shift in American foreign policy. It abandoned the Cold War strategy of deterrence in favor of "pre-emptive warfare." The doctrine argued that because extreme terrorists could not be deterred by traditional threats, the United States had the right to use military force against hostile groups and rogue states before they could attack America.

Launched in October 2001 in direct response to the 9/11 attacks, the War in Afghanistan was the first major military application of the Bush Doctrine. The United States and its allies (including the NZ SAS) invaded to dismantle Al-Qaeda and overthrow the Taliban government that sheltered them. While initially successful, it evolved into a grueling twenty-year conflict, ending with the Taliban regaining control in 2021.

Founded by Osama bin Laden in 1988, Al-Qaeda is a militant Islamic extremist network that emerged from the Soviet-Afghan War. Its primary goal is to expel Western military influence from Muslim countries and establish a fundamentalist state. Using global terrorism to achieve these political aims, the group orchestrated several deadly attacks, most notably the devastating September 11, 2001, hijackings against the United States.

**Timeline of 9/11:**

- 8:46 AM: American Airlines Flight 11 strikes the North Tower of the World Trade Center.
- 8:58 AM: American Airlines Flight 76 strikes the South Tower of the World Trade Center.
- 9:03 AM: United Airlines Flight 175 strikes the South Tower of the World Trade Center.
- 9:59 AM: United Airlines Flight 93 crashes into a field in Pennsylvania.
- 10:28 AM: The towers collapse, causing the World Trade Center to collapse.
- 10:29 AM: The towers collapse, causing the World Trade Center to collapse.

The Level 2/3 class have been working on their second assessment this term. The focus topic has been the 2001, September 11 attacks. The students have learnt about the origins of the attack through the Soviet-Afghan war, what happened the day of the attacks, and the fallout on a geopolitical level. They have also gained great knowledge on how this significant event impacted New Zealand for many years afterwards.

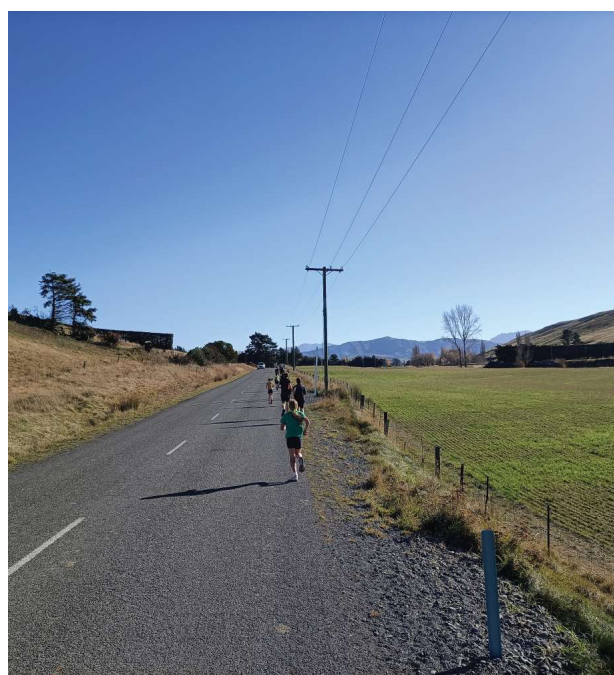
The sun was shining on May 11th for the Hurunui College Cross Country. It was a beautiful day with fantastic participation and team spirit on display from all of our students.

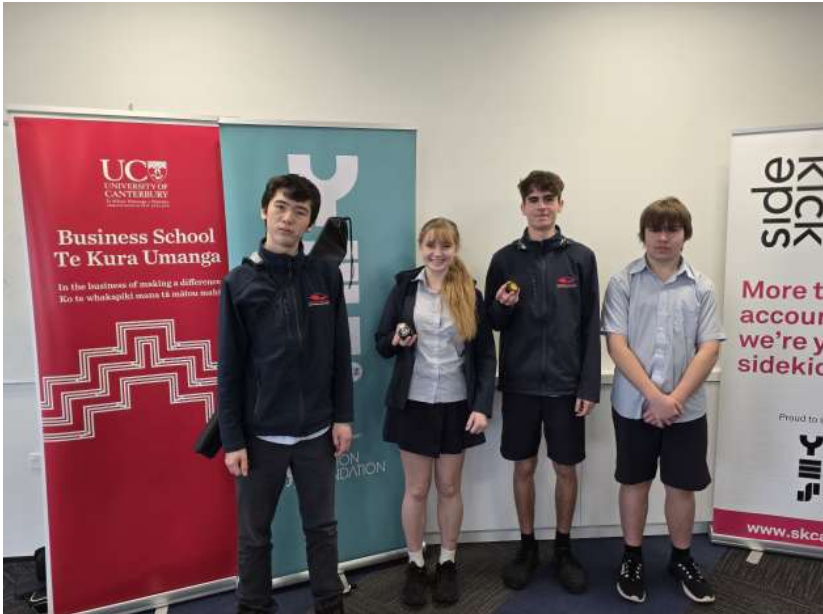

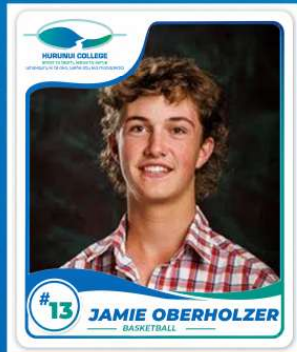

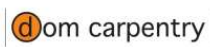
